Sharing stories for education and enjoyment dates back to our First Nations people, storytelling is the primary way their history was recorded and how this history has been passed down through the generations.



NAPLAN

NAPLAN started this week for our Year 3 and 5 students. This week our students completed their Writing, Reading and Conventions of Language assessments. On Monday they will complete the Numeracy assessment. We will then spend the rest of the week catching up on any assessments that students may have missed due to absence.

Possum

Last week we discovered a possum living under one of the covered walkways here at school. WIRES came to collect the possum and check over it to make sure it was healthy. Our possum is a healthy female who is approximately one and half years old. Because she is over a certain weight, she is classed as being an independent possum and therefore lives away from her mother. WIRES seem to think that the possum's mother has had another baby and our possum has had to find a new home.

After spending a few days with WIRES, the WIRES workers have provided a possum box and located it in the trees right next to the school on the council grounds. Over the past few days, the possum has made its way back into the same spot under one of covered walkways. We are going to reach out to WIRES to see if they can provide another nesting box for the possum that can be placed in one of our trees on school grounds so it can sleep there during the day.



Our students have been very curious about the possum and very respectful of its space. I have included a fact sheet about possums from WIRES with this newsletter.




Stage 2 News-Term 1

Stage 2 students have had a fantastic start to the year and are completing some amazing work with Ms Ross, Mr Duncan, Miss Catto and Miss Gubbins.


3R & 3/4D

BE A HERO FOR POSSUMS AND GLIDERS

While commonly sighted animals such as Brushtail possums and Ringtail possums have adapted well to living in urbanised environments, they are under increasing pressure from loss of habitat and native food sources.

Here are some of the actions we can all take to co-exist harmoniously with our possum and glider populations.





If you find an injured possum or glider, or an infant that appears to be on its own, contact WIRES. Call: 1300 094 737 Download the app: wires.org.au/rescue/rescue-app Report online: wires.org.au/rescue/report-a-rescue





It's easy and relatively inexpensive to create an artificial home for Ringtail possums, using wire hanging baskets with coconut fibre linings, which most closely replicate the size and comfort of a natural home or 'drey'.

It's important to remember that possums and gliders are protected in NSW. You can find out more about living harmoniously with them and other wildlife at www.wires.org.au You can buy nesting boxes or build your own, which are favoured by Brushtail possums. It's recommended that you locate a suitable tree in your backyard and fix the box at least four metres above the ground. If you think you have a possum in your roof, it is recommended that you use humane methods to encourage the possum to move outside by providing an alternative nesting spot in a nearby tree. It is illegal to kill or relocate a possum; or trap one without a licence. You can find out more at the NSW Government link provided below.




